Brazilian President Dilma Rousseff on Friday will inaugurate a thermoelectric power plant which was built with China's help and can provide energy for a million people, a presidential statement said on Wednesday.

<u>China to step up controversial technology plans</u> (NPR, 1/27/2011) China plans to step up efforts to develop clean energy and other technology industries this year, government officials said Thursday, a strategy that has strained trade ties with Washington and other governments.

<u>China's power demand growth may slow to 9% this year, NEA says</u> (Bloomberg, 1/27/2011) China, the world's biggest energy user, may cut power consumption growth this year as government

measures to cool the economy and reduce greenhouse gas emissions damp demand, the National Energy Administration said.

<u>China issues guidelines to create quieter environment</u> (East Day, 1/26/2011) China's 11 government departments have jointly released a guideline outlining major measures to lessen noise pollution amid rising noise disputes and complaints, the Ministry of Environmental Protection said Tuesday.

<u>China to build 10 more mega nuclear reactors</u> (India Times, 1/25/2011) China will construct 10 more mega nuclear reactors with a whopping investment of USD 121.5 billion, in addition to 25 currently being built, to step up its atomic power generation to meet its rising energy demands.

<u>China tightens rules for solar polysilicon plants, may force consolidation</u> (Bloomberg, 1/25/2011) China tightened rules for polysilicon factories, a move that may spur consolidation in the country that is the world's largest supplier of solar panels.

<u>China plans to expand energy tax nationwide</u> (AP, 1/25/2011) China's finance minister says Beijing plans to impose a nationwide tax on production of oil, coal and water to raise money for poor areas.

<u>Australia</u>, <u>China to work together on depolluting Poyang Lake</u> (India Times, 1/23/2011) Chinese and Australian scientists are set to work together to reduce pollution in the Poyang Lake, China's largest freshwater lake, state media reported.

<u>US-China energy dealmaking</u> (Center for American Progress, 1/21/2011) President Barack Obama and China's President Hu Jintao shake hands after their joint news conference on January 19, 2011.
