<u>Dumping Solar: Downstream U.S. Solar PV Businesses Join CASM, Case Against China's Unfair Trade Practices</u> (Clean Technica, 5/10/12) More than 200 US solar industry participants

employing some 17,000 workers have joined CASM— the Coalition for American Solar Manufacturing, the industry/trade association announced yesterday. As it turns out, just 20 CASM members are manufacturers of solar photovoltaic (PV) systems; 85% are involved not in solar energy manufacturing, but in downstream businesses, such as solar PV design and solar energy systems sales, marketing and installation, project development, consumer finance, solar energy systems integration and legal services.

China Key to Green Tech Innovation' (Carey L. Biron, AlterNet, 5/9/12) With U.S. federal funding sources for renewable energy sources already drying up, coupled with a newfound antipathy towards "green" issues issue here in Washington, some are suggesting that China could offer an important opportunity for the future of renewables in the United States and around the world.

China's love of pork presents a mountain of a problem for the environment, 1.4 million metric tons (1.5 million tons) of pig poo a year to be precise, but an Australian company believes it has part of the answer. Red tide threatens fisheries off east China (Xinhua, 5/9/12) A red tide measuring more than 100 square kilometers drifting toward east China's coastline is threatening local fish and aquaculture industries, as it can suffocate marine life, local authorities said.

304 Chinese die from indoor air pollution a day (China Daily, 5/10/12) Indoor air population causes an average of 304 deaths per day in China, China Youth Daily reported Thursday, quoting a survey. The survey, released by the China National Interior Decoration Association, shows 111,000 Chinese people are dying from indoor air pollution every year.

CORPORATIONS

Vehicle fumes pump up Shanghai pollution (Shi Yingying, China Daily, 5/8/12) Shanghai's vehicle exhaust contributed to at least 25 percent of PM2.5 — the fine particulate matter 2.5 microns or less in diameter — in the city's atmosphere. Bad driving habits such as rapid acceleration and deceleration, especially by diesel vehicle drivers, leads to worse air pollution, a senior environmental official said on Tuesday.

<u>Living with Foxconn</u> (Meng Si, China Dialogue, 5/10/12) Residents near the manufacturer's plant in Taiyuan city are up in arms over a toxic stench. Meng Si went to meet the community that doesn't much care for Apple's gadgets.

Cnooc Deploys Oil Rig as Weapon to Assert China Sea Claims (Daniel Ten Kate, Bloomberg, 5/10/12) China's first deep—water drilling rig began operations near islands in the South China Sea in a move to assert Beijing's territorial claims as travel agencies suspended tours to the Philippines amid safety concerns.

<u>Half of China's tap water fails to meet national standards</u> (Economic Times, 5/9/12) Half of China's tap water does not meet national drinking water standards, but the problem is not so severe as to cause an immediate threat to human health, an official survey said.

China to construct more energy-efficient buildings-Xinhua (Melanie Lee, Reuters, 5/6/12) China wants energy-efficient buildings to account for 30 percent of all new construction projects by 2020 to bring its building energy consumption ratio closer to that of developed countries, the official Xinhua News Agency reported on Sunday.

<u>Yingli Dodges Solar Squeeze as Yuan Costs Tumble</u> (Bloomberg, 5/6/12) Yingli Green Energy Holding Co., China's third-biggest solar-energy equipment maker, looks like a survivor in an industry that's losing investor support, the bond market shows.

<u>China debates renewables quotas to cut wind curtailment</u> (Dominique Patterson, Recharge News, 5/7/12) China is drawing up plans for a renewable energy quota system that could require grid companies to transmit up to 15% of their power from renewable sources.

<u>Colombia, China discuss coal mining ventures, possible rail project</u> (Platts, 5/10/12) China is interested in helping Colombia develop its mostly unexploited deposits of metallurgical or coking coal, the Colombian government said Thursday.

<u>Six regions warned for energy overuse</u> (Lan Lan, China Daily, 5/5/12) Six regions in China received "red-light warnings" for their failure in the first quarter of 2012 to do enough to conserve energy, according to a progress report the country released on Friday.

Is Canada taking China for granted when it comes to energy? (Claudia Cattaneo, Financial Post, 5/4/12) In the debate about whether Canada should welcome China's growing investment in our energy, a couple of crucial points have been getting little air time: Canada's energy isn't as indispensible to China as some assume, and China is at least as motivated by learning how to operate in a Western market economy as it is by securing energy to fuel its future.

<u>Water usage to be monitored better</u> (China Daily, 5/8/12) A nationwide information management system for water resources will be set up within the next three years to improve the country's monitoring abilities of its fast—growing water consumption and deteriorating water quality, officials said.
