Tesla, Kandi Jolted Up By Richer Chinese EV Subsidies (Investor's Business Daily, 02/10/2014) Shares of Tesla Motors (TSLA) climbed sharply Monday after China said it will give more subsidies for electric vehicles than announced earlier, as it pushes to cut rising air pollution.

<u>Private-Equity Investors Join China's Environmental Cleanup</u> (Wall Street Journal, 02/11/2014) Private-equity firms are again betting on China's environmental sector as the government adopts a new sense of urgency in cleaning up the nation's filthy air and water.

Nation to launch major anti-pollution plans (China Daily, 02/12/2014) Central govt emphasizes economic instruments to improve air quality. The central government will introduce a series of policies to implement a landmark anti-pollution action plan that aims to reduce airborne particles.

<u>China to extend electric car subsidies beyond 2015</u> (ECNS, 02/12/2014) China, the world's second-largest energy user, will give more subsidies for electric cars than the previously announced and extend the incentive program beyond 2015 to help reduce air pollution.

<u>China says no cover-ups using state secrecy as excuse</u> (Reuters, 02/03/2014) China has unveiled new rules telling officials not to cover up what should be publicly available

information using the excuse it is a state secret, in what state media said was a move towards greater government transparency.

<u>China under pressure in meeting emissions targets: official</u> (Xinhua, 02/11/2014) China is facing pressure in meeting the emissions cut targets set in its pollution control plan by 2015, an environment official said Tuesday.

<u>China says gets tough on polluters, nixes projects worth \$19.5 bln</u> (Reuters, 02/11/2014) China's environmental watchdog vetoed as many as 32 projects with a total investment of 118.4 billion yuan (\$19.5 billion) last year as it stepped up efforts to get tough on industrial polluters, a senior official said on Tuesday.

<u>2013 China's progress report on combating pollution</u> (Xinhua, 02/11/2014) In recent years, China has made great efforts to improve the quality of its environment. It has stepped up efforts especially after many Chinese cities experienced more than usual smoggy days in the past few years.

<u>China to set up \$2 billion fund to help fight smog</u> (ENDS Europe, 02/12/2014) The Chinese government said on Wednesday said it will set up a 10 billion yuan (S\$2 billion) fund to fight air pollution, offering rewards for companies that clean up their operations.
