<u>PM2.5 density drops in Beijing</u> (China.org.cn, 06/18/2014) Density of PM2.5, or particles smaller than 2.5 micrometers in diameter, has dropped 7.6 percent from previous year in Beijing-Tianjing-Hebei region in the first five months of 2014, China's Environment Minister Zhou Shengxian said Thursday.

<u>Scientists warn of tourism threat to Antarctica</u> (Tengrinews, 06/19/2014) Antarctic scientists warned Wednesday that a surge in tourists visiting the frozen continent was threatening its fragile environment and called for better protection, AFP reports.

<u>AIR POLLUTION COMPLAINTS IN CHINA'S CAPITAL DOUBLES IN 5 MONTHS</u> (Auto World News, 06/16/2014) Complaints regarding air pollution in Beijing have doubled in the first five months of 2014, according to the city environment authority. The Beijing Municipal Environmental Bureau said on June 13 that 12,599 formal complaints about smog were lodged by members of the public from January to May.

GOVERNMENT

<u>China arrests 186 for environmental pollution in 2013</u> (People's Daily Online, 06/12/2014) China arrested 186 people on charges of environmental pollution in 2013 in a total of 109 cases, environment minister Zhou Shengxian announced on Thursday. He did not reveal how many were convicted. Environmental authorities shut down more than 3,500 companies and workshops in a nationwide campaign last year, uncovering 6,499 cases involving environmental problems, he said.

Environmental graft targeted (China Daily, 06/13/2014) Top prosecuting body gets tougher with officials who help in cover-ups. Authorities will severely punish government officials who abuse their power to cover up environmental crimes, the Supreme People's Procuratorate said on Thursday.
